Between the rigors of Holy Week in early April and the onset of the sacramental season in May and June, most parishes experience a few weeks of calm. Why not set aside a day during this time to renew the parish staff?

Announce in the bulletin that the office will be closed that day. Structure the day with opportunities for silent reflection, prayer and a program to recommit.

Here's a possible agenda:

- Start with a prayer that allows staff members to share their special intentions.
- Set aside an hour of quiet time. Ask staff members to silently reflect on the experience of Lent, Holy Week and Easter.
- Come back together to share special moments of conversion, inspiration and outreach that happened during Lent and Easter.
- Celebrate with a catered lunch or an outing to a local restaurant.
- Start the afternoon with a prayer that encourages staff members to pray for one another.
- Set aside an hour of quiet time. Ask staff members to reflect on the gifts of each person on the staff.
- Come back together to identify the strengths of the staff. Encourage ideas on how you can work together more effectively to serve the people of the parish.
- Close with a recommitment service and prayers of thanksgiving to the risen Lord for this opportunity for spiritual renewal.

We've Got Your Numbers!

How many of your neighbors are Catholic? Across the United States, 23.2 percent of the population is Catholic (2006). But what about in your state? Five states have a Catholic population of more than 30 percent — Rhode Island, 59.2 percent; Massachusetts, 42.7; New Jersey, 41.1; Connecticut, 38.7; and New York, 37.6. On the other end of the spectrum, four states are below 4 percent — Arkansas, 3.9 percent; South Carolina, 3.7; Alabama, 3.4; and the lowest, Tennessee, 3.2. reviewing everything bishops discussed at their world synod that concluded the Year of the Eucharist in 2005, Pope Benedict has released this pastoral document so that each of us may approach the Eucharist with a renewed sense of wonder and joy. Writing to Catholics worldwide — not as a theologian, but as a personal pastor — the pope explains that he wishes to encourage “Christian people to deepen their understanding of the relationship between the Eucharistic mystery, the liturgical action, and the new spiritual worship which derives from the Eucharist as the sacrament of charity.”
